Purpose

The purpose of Simpson Foundation is to promote nature based solutions as lasting solutions to overcome the injustice of poverty. We endeavor to be part of a global, regional and local movement for change, to empower people to create a future that is secure, just, and free from poverty.

Our Belief

We strongly believe that the restoration of degraded ecosystem, the development of climate change adaptation and mitigation actions through value creation as a sustainable incentive is the most viable and lasting solution to address the social, economic and environmental problems causing poverty, hunger, inequalities in Malawi.

Our Commitment

This Strategic Plan sets out the commitment and the priorities for Simpson Foundation for the six years, 2021-2026. It is the strategy that Simpson Foundation will use to guide resources, partnerships, collaborations, programs and fundraising, and how we operate in the next 6 years. It is the shared agenda with our focus target groups, communities, stakeholders and partners to promote nature based solutions that will reverse and reduce the level of environmental degradation. The strategic plan will guide and enable us achieve sustainable restoration of ecosystems to reduce poverty, hunger, inequalities, and ensure that targeted communities enjoys health and well-being in a justice society.

Our vision

Enhancing resilient and adaptive capacity for vulnerable and poor communities



Our mission

Is to create an environment that will enable communities to be resilient, adaptive to climate change shocks, through the provision of knowledge and expertise.



Core Values

Our values define our commitment on what we do, how we do it and unite us with our partners in our work.

Knowledge sharing

Enhance access to knowledge and best practice information that is needed by poor people to participate in decision making to enhance resilience and adaptive capacities to climate related shocks, stresses and uncertainty

We are accountable to those whose lives we hope to see transformed, to those we work with and to those who support us.

We work with others to maximize our impact, respecting diversity and difference in the pursuit of common goals.

Opportunities and challenges

Drivers and Challenges

Land degradation remains the major contributing factor causing poverty, hunger and unfair sharing of natural resources in Malawi. 60% of Malawi's land is currently affected by soil erosion and nutrient loss at a rate of 29 tons of soil per hectare per year. (Word Bank Report 2019).

Population, Poverty and Livelihoods

Malawi is facing rapid population growth which is exerting pressure and stress on the natural resource base. Natural resources are the main source of livelihood for the poor population.

Wealth and Natural capital

Malawi's wealth is dominated by renewable natural capital (43%), mainly cropland which is declining due to pressures of land degradation, reduced forest land area, and climate.

Institutions, Policies and expenditure

The Environment and Natural Resource sector has many policy contradictions and gaps. Much of Malawi's wealth 43% comes from renewable natural capital, which suggests a need for close alignment of policy and legal frameworks that guide the management of the country's natural resources.

Climate change and resilience

Malawi is highly vulnerable to the impacts of climate change and the economy and livelihoods are directly dependent on rain-fed agriculture. However, when climate variability impacts on soil health and land degradation, farm systems struggle to be productive. This lead to increased poverty and food insecurity.

Opportunities

Malawi Vision 2063

A resolution of Malawi to be "an inclusively Wealthy and Self –reliant Nation" by among other things investing in:

Sustainable Land Management Practices

Investments in soil and water conservation, soil fertility improvement, conservation agriculture and agroforestry.

Climate Smart and Resilient Agriculture

Investments in climate smart technologies and practices in all sector.

Health and Nutrition

Investments in universal health coverage with quality, equitable and affordable health care for all Malawians

Environmental Sustainability

Investments in environmental sustainability to ensure sustainable development with programmes based on minimizing depletion of natural resources.

Operational goal 3: Active Youth groups

To voice fair sharing and sustainable management of natural resource

Youth groups empowered to engage communities to be more active in calling for fair and just sharing of natural resources. Youth groups empowered to hold political and social leaders to account on policies that influence access and control of natural resources.



Operational Goal 4: Leadership engagement

Engage leaders from across society to prioritize nature based solutions safe water, sanitation and hygiene, with a particular focus on the rights of the poorest and most marginalized communities

Ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all.



Growth



We are currently active in central region of the Malawi in the following three districts: Lilongwe, Dowa and Mchinji






